Patty Knecht, Chief Nursing Officer at Ascend Learning (ATI), is a nationally respected voice in nursing education with over 40 years of experience as a nurse, educator, and advocate. Representing an organization that supports more than 60% of the nation's undergraduate nursing programs, Patty offers a comprehensive and data-informed view of the field—making her perspective invaluable.

As CNO, Patty champions thought leadership and public affairs, transforming client relationships from product-focused engagements to partnerships focused on data-driven individual/program outcomes supported by policy advocacy. Her leadership has positioned ATI as a proactive voice on the issues that matter most to nursing programs nationwide, such as improving student/faculty retention and graduating competent, confident practitioners.

Patty's influence reaches across the healthcare and education spectrum. She serves on the Board of Directors and Executive Committee at Penn Medicine Chester County Hospital, the Board of Trustees at Immaculata University, and the Editorial Board of the Journal of Nursing Regulation.

A prominent voice in the nursing education space, she has contributed to high-level discussions with policymakers, been featured in outlets like The New York Times and Bloomberg, and continues to shape national discourse through panels, op-eds, and podcasts—cementing her role as a changemaker.

Since July 2023, Patty Knecht has significantly advanced the national conversation around nursing education and workforce development. While public discourse focuses on provider shortages, Patty has broadened the lens—urging media, policymakers, and healthcare leaders to address the upstream crisis in nursing education.

Under her leadership, ATI has become a trusted resource for insights on the workforce pipeline, shifting the narrative toward long-term, education-focused solutions. Patty led the development of four strategic policy pillars to guide ATI's advocacy: academic readiness, faculty shortages, nursing student success, and patient safety. By anchoring her thought leadership in these critical areas—and connecting ATI's robust data with real-world educator feedback—she has delivered targeted, actionable insights to decision-makers nationwide.

Notably, Patty leveraged ATI's data showing that academic unpreparedness was the top reason students delayed nursing school applications and linked it to broader learning loss trends post-COVID. This insight caught the attention of The Wall Street Journal and other national media outlets, elevating the urgency of the issue nationally.

Over the past year, Patty has briefed multiple national policymakers—including Sen. Roger Marshall (R-KS), Congressman Smucker (PA_11), and Congressman Carson (IN-7)—and is helping organize a roundtable in Kansas to address local and national education needs. She also serves as the leading voice from the education sector in the Healthcare Workforce Coalition, where she has met with officials from HHS, AHA, and FHA, and mentors nursing educators to amplify their own thought leadership through media outreach. Patty's impact is strategic, collaborative, and lasting.

Patty's inclusion in thought leadership pieces not only amplifies her perspective but offers powerful third-party validation of the data-driven insights she brings to national conversations around nursing education, workforce readiness, and overall mentorship.

In a Wall Street Journal piece, Patty connects ATI's real-time data on academic preparedness among nursing students with national concerns about post-pandemic learning loss. Her commentary underscores the urgency of addressing foundational education challenges as a prerequisite to solving the larger nursing workforce shortage. By bringing this upstream issue into a mainstream publication, Patty helped shift the focus beyond provider shortages to the structural barriers that are keeping students from entering and succeeding in nursing programs.

The article illustrates how Patty uses evidence to reframe public and policymaker understanding of the crisis, advocating for solutions that address root causes rather than symptoms. Her inclusion in nationally recognized outlets not only demonstrates her influence, but also affirms her ability to elevate underrepresented issues into the public and policy spotlight.

Other commentary from Patty highlights another central theme to her leadership style: mentorship. She actively supports diverse nursing careers, advocates for robust mentor-driven development, and leads by example in elevating women in healthcare. Her commitment to guiding others underscores why mentorship is vital to her leadership and strengthens her nomination.

These examples substantiate the claims made throughout this nomination and serve as examples of how Patty's thought leadership is not just present—it is impactful, timely, and widely recognized.
